**B**orn into a long standing farming family at Tattenhall in Cheshire after leaving school he worked on the family farm and attended Reaseheath Agricultural College where he obtained an N.C.A. qualification.

Following the Foot and Mouth outbreak in 1967 which took the Dairy herd Ray left the family farm and entered the Agricultural Machinery Business, starting in 1968 selling Ford Tractors. Then in 1970 he joined a Farm Machinery Manufacturer selling to the dealers and in 1978 he moved to Mill Loaders in Wolverhampton as Home and Export Sales Manager.

However in 1981 Mill sold the Agricultural Business and Ray then left the Farm Machinery Business achieving the position of NFU Group Secretary for the Eccleshall & Stone Branches. Along with the appointment he held as self-employed Agency for NFU Mutual Insurance - a business that grew beyond his expectations starting with a turnover of £420k which, by the time of retiring in 2011, had grown to £3.6million and a staff of 7.

Married to Anne for 40yrs they have 3children who are all married and have 6 Grandchildren. For all their married life they have lived at Church Aston, Newport.

In addition to Masonry Ray is heavily involved in the running of the Staffordshire County Showground being a senior Chief Steward in the running of the show for 24yrs. He is also a Director and past Chairman of the board. In addition he was the County President in 2019.

He joined Craft Masonry in 1993 with Gordon Lodge, 2149 in Stoke-on-Trent becoming WM in 2001 and was subsequently DC for 8yrs. In 1996 he joined Audley Lodge, 1896 meeting in Newport, Shropshire and was WM in 2007 & 2012.

Due to commercial pressure he delayed his membership of Mark Masonry until retiring in 2011 at which point he joined RT&R Lodge, 1630 meeting at Newport. He was WM in 2016/17.

His first Mark Provincial Appointment was to Grand Junior Deacon in 2017 and he now joins the team as Grand Junior Overseer.

He is a member of RAM, Royal Arch, Red Cross of Constantine, Rose Croix, &KT.

Rays hobby is enjoying breaks in a Touring Caravan which he and Anne have enjoyed for 35yrs. But this year it has never moved not only due to Covid19 (his wife is extremely vulnerable and needs to shield) but also due to him having a hip operation in March with a knee operation at the end of November.

Hopefully all our readers will have read the first part of Mark Ashton's "Bone Marrow Transplant" story back in September, well here's Part 2.

In my mind the family would be in contact as soon as the six month embargo was up. They weren't. However, I can still clearly remember how and when they did. What had seemed an eternity, was in fact only 2½ weeks!

It was early on a Sunday evening, and thoughts had turned to the upcoming week's work – as they did. The phone rang and I answered it. The voice said "Is that Mark Ashton?" I answered "Yes." He then said "I'm ringing to say thank you for saving my life."

Those words are etched into my being, and were the start of an hour and a half's magical call with six year old Sam and mainly his parents Bruce and Lee.

Lee explained that she and Bruce had deliberated and fretted over how to initiate the contact, but just didn't know how best to express their heartfelt gratitude. In the end they come up with the wonderful idea of letting Sam be the first to speak.

One of their questions, as we hit it off and briefly caught up with each other's life stories, was "Could you come to Vancouver in September, so that you and Sam can be together for the first anniversary of your transplant – as our guests?"

And so it was that my wife, three year old son and I spent three weeks of September 1990 in British Columbia with the three of them – what memories! If you've not been to Vancouver, Vancouver Island and the BC Rockies, and get the chance, grab it with both hands. They're rated high in the world list of top places to live for good reasons.

Our story, to garner support for Bone Marrow Transplant organisations, which are generally not government funded, had been picked-up by local TV, Radio and national print media before our departure. This continued on our arrival in Canada, both at the airport and for the next few days. During this time we got to meet the extended family, before being given the use of Bruce's boss's huge RV for ten days and heading off to Banff, Jasper, etc. in the Rockies. Incidentally it was that same man who had funded our return airfares – writing this I now wonder if he was a Mason it's the sort of thing we do isn't it, I must ask the question.

And so before we knew it the three weeks of memory-making were up and it was time to say 'Au revoir'.

Up until the day of our return flight, if you'd have asked me about 'out of body experiences' the logical/analytical part of me would have won through, but that changed. On the long flight back to the UK I deliberately hardly slept. This was mainly to deal with the jet-lag, but I know when I nodded off for about 40 minutes. During that fairly short time period, at around 3am Vancouver time, Sam woke up and saw me sat on the end of his bed – he felt safe. Who knows how or why, not me, but neither do I believe in that sort of coincidence!

Life soon got back to normal, with the occasional opportunity to share some of the video we'd taken to publicise and fundraise for Bone Marrow Transplant organisations. The gist of the talk was to ask the stark question, "What would you do if you became life threateningly ill with a blood cancer, and didn't have a sibling to receive a transplant from?" The only answer if you don't have a brother or sister, or one that matches, is turn to unrelated donors through such magnificent, underfunded organisations.

Whilst still a teenager Sam was selected, by Vancouver Children's Hospital, to present a paper at a world medical conference being held in London. Thankfully there was time during the visit for him, accompanied by one of the male nurses, to visit us in Staffordshire & Shropshire. Hailing from the 'New World' he particularly wanted to see our historical canals, so we took him to see them and The Potteries, and to stand on the world's first Iron Bridge, which we duly did.

We are yet to meet again in person, but with the marvellous improvements in technology over the years have kept in contact. And so, when the Chinese Coronavirus is tamed, one of the first places Beverley and I will be heading is Vancouver, to celebrate our 'fluke' of genetics, the amazing people who work in this field of medical science, and Sam's extended life.

As the story of the Round Table Britain and Ireland's Anthony Nolan appeal is an ongoing success story and one of triumph over adversity it is a nice way to round off 2020 and hope for brighter prospects in 2021.
